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over a hundred of the lay and clerical visitors in the market-house. The chair was occupied by the reverend host. When the cloth was removed, the Chairman proposed in feeling and appropriate terms the "Health of his Holiness the Pope," a toast which was drunk with the greatest enthusiasm. The Chairman then gave "The Health of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese." His Lordship in returning thanks, praised in the warmest terms the zeal of pastor and people, and complimented Mr. Haguo, the architect, on the beauty of the new church. The Chairman then gave the healths of "The Most Rev. Preacher and the Bishop of Clogher." Both toasts were duly honoured, and their lordships briefly replied. The Most Rev. Dr. Nulty then proposed the health of their host "The Rev. Peter O'Reilly." The Rev. Chairman having responded, gave the toasts of "The Visitors," responded to by Mr. Callan, M.P.*; "The Architect," responded to by Mr. Haguo; and "The Press," responded to by Mr. A. M. Sullivan*, who on rising was loudly applauded. In a speech of singular eloquence Mr. Sullivan sketched the history of the great Catholic revival of modern days, pointing out how the Irish, not alone in Ireland, but in the Austral and the Western world, in remote American backwoods, and under the Southern Cross, were raising in honour of the Most High splendid temples which rivalled the glories of Cashel and Monasterboice (cheers). The proceedings shortly afterwards terminated.—
